The season has attempted to do this, featuring thematic evenings, with diverse offerings of music and words performed at a very high standard by some of the city's most interesting and accomplished artists. In recent years, Toronto Masque Theatre presented mixed programs on the themes of trees and stars, with songs and readings inspired by those profound and lasting images. Tonight, we dive into rivers! ARTISTS' BIOGRAPHIES

Cole Alvis is a Métis theatre artist based in Tkarón:to with Chippewa, Irish and English heritage from the Turtle Mountains in Manitobah. They are one of the leaders of lemonTree creations, manidoons collective, Ad Hoc Assembly (AHA) and are the former executive director of the Indigenous Performing Arts Alliance (2013–2017). Cole has performed in Dora-nominated productions, including *Gorey Story (The Thistle Project*), Louis Riel (Canadian Opera Company / National Arts Centre) and the Dora-winning new play Body Politic by Nick Green (lemonTree creations / Buddies in Bad Times Theatre). Recently, Cole participated in the 2017 artEquity Facilitator Training in Los Angeles and directed the world premiere of bug by Yolanda Bonnell at the 2018 Luminato Festival (manidoons collective). Cole just finished directing Lilies: Or The Revival Of A Romantic Drama by Michel Marc Bouchard for the Buddies in Bad Times Theatre 40th season, a co-production with Why Not Theatre and lemonTree creations.

Confluence Artistic Producer Larry Beckwith enjoys a successful and versatile career in the arts in and around Toronto. He vigorously pursues his interests in choral music, baroque music, theatre, contemporary music, radio, teaching and writing. He has lectured on music history for the universities of Toronto and Guelph, and has held positions as a producer for CBC Radio Music (1990–1997), general manager of Choirs Ontario (1997-2002), director of programming for the 2002 Joy of Singing Festival in Toronto and artistic director of Toronto Masque Theatre (2003–2018). In recent years, Larry has been active as a conductor with Opera in Concert, Toronto Operetta Theatre and the Festival of the Sound. A passionate educator, Larry teaches in the renowned arts program at Unionville High School and is the conductor of the Senior Mooredale Youth Orchestra.

In a word ... multifaceted. Juno-nominated **Dylan Bell**'s musical curiosity keeps him effortlessly crossing and blurring musical boundaries. Dylan is an international leader in a cappella music, having sung with many of Canada's premiere vocal ensembles such as FreePlay, Retrocity, Cadence, The Watch and Hampton Avenue. He also freelances as a keyboardist and bassist. Behind the mixing board, Dylan has produced several award-winning albums, including a Juno nomination for the Cadence album *Twenty For One; Ferris Wheels* with the world-renowned Swingles, and the Juno-nominated *Skin Tight* by a cappella legends The Nylons. Dylan's compositions and arrangements have garnered international recognition as winner of the John Lennon Songwriting Competition and Contemporary A Cappella Recording Awards. When it comes to vocal arranging, Dylan wrote the book – literally. *A Cappella Arranging* (co-written with Deke Sharon) was published in 2013 to international acclaim.

lan Cusson is a composer of Métis and French Canadian descent. His work explores Canadian Indigenous experience, including the history of the Métis people, the hybridity of mixed-racial identity, and the intersection of Western and Indigenous cultures. He has studied with Jake Heggie, Samuel Dolin, James Anagnoson and Johannes Debus. Ian is an inaugural Carrefour Composer-in-Residence with the National Arts Centre Orchestra for 2017–2019 and will be composer-in-residence for the Canadian Opera Company for 2019-2021. He is an associate composer of the Canadian Music Centre and a member of the Canadian League of Composers. He lives in Oakville with his wife and four children.

James Meade, who hails from the Caribbean island Montserrat, is a long-time parishioner of St. Thomas's church. He and his wife, Joan, who were married at St. Thomas 52 years ago, have three children, and four of their seven grandchildren were baptized at this church. One son, Vincent, serves as an acolyte. A retired educator, James served as the English department head at Sir John A. Macdonald Collegiate and L'Amoreaux Collegiate in Scarborough, and for many years he taught English in the Bridging Program at Woodsworth College, University of Toronto. James values the opportunity to give God thanks for the many blessings that He has bestowed on him and his family.

Marion Newman, Kwagiulth and Stó:lō First Nations, English, Irish and Scottish mezzo-soprano, is firmly established as one of Canada's most accomplished singers. Noted for her "sumptuous mezzo tone and impressive vocal agility," on the concert stage, Marion has performed with the best ensembles, symphonies and choirs across Canada. Her extensive repertoire ranges from Vivaldi to Vivier and includes Handel's Messiah, De Falla's El Amor Brujo, Rossini's Petite Messe Solennelle and Mozart's Requiem. Recent appearances include world premieres of several works, operas and concerts that speak to Marion's First Nations identity. She is much sought after as an advisor for arts organizations wishing to take an active and continuing role in reconciliation. Recent highlights for Marion included the role of Dr. Wilson in the premiere of Missing with City Opera Vancouver/Pacific Opera Victoria, I Call Myself Princess by Jani Lauzon and the title role in Shawnadithit for Tapestry Opera.

Patricia O'Callaghan's career has taken her across genres and continents. As a speaker of French, Spanish and German, her concert and operatic repertoire is diverse. She has sung with the Orpheus Chamber Orchestra and Don Byron Quartet, and has performed in venues ranging from London's Royal Opera House to New York's Le Poisson Rouge. Patricia also writes songs and has had the honour of premiering

many new compositions from both the classical and pop worlds. She has worked with R. Murray Schafer, Dennis Lee, Christos Hatzis, Steve Reich, David Braid and Steven Page. As a resident artist at Toronto's Soulpepper Theatre for six years, her responsibilities included conducting, teaching, mentoring, producing, curating, performing and developing new work. She has five solo CDs and has collaborated on many others. Her newest albums are *Deepest December, Matador: The Songs of Leonard Cohen* and the recently JUNO nominated *Corona Divinae Misericordiae* by David Braid.

DORA award-winning, JUNO-nominated world/fusion vocalist **Suba Sankaran** effortlessly combines musical worlds, performing across North America, Europe, the UK, Asia, Australia and Africa with Autorickshaw, master drummer Trichy Sankaran, FreePlay and Retrocity. Highlights include performing for Peter Gabriel, Nelson Mandela and Archbishop Desmond Tutu, and performing with Jane Siberry, Lorraine Segato, Bobby McFerrin and the Swingles. Recently, Suba made her acting debut at Stratford Festival, where she has served for two seasons as vocal coach/arranger and sound designer. Suba is in demand as a private teacher, educator, choral director, arranger, adjudicator and composer, and has given numerous workshops to choirs around the world.

Born in Tehran, **Bijan Sepanji** has been gaining recognition as an active performer, educator and mentor throughout Canada, United States and most recently in Iran. He is a member of the Toronto Concert Orchestra and has performed at venues such as the Rogers Centre, Roy Thomson Hall, Toronto Centre for the Arts, many more. Last year, alongside his professional string quartet - the Ton Beau - he gave masterclasses at the University of Toronto and Vanderbilt University in Nashville, Tennessee. Bijan also offered a workshop to the composition students of Tehran University in May 2018, together with the accomplished Iranian composer, Saman Shahi.

Vocalist, composer and educator **Jacqueline Teh** is a graduate of the University of Toronto Master's of Jazz Performance program. She has composed music for and performed with various U of T ensembles and is featured in the U of T Jazz 12tet's 2016 album *Trillium Falls*. Jacqueline is active in both the Toronto jazz and choral communities. Recently, Jacqueline's jazz/R&B ensemble, Moodset, was selected as part of TD Jazz Festival's Discovery Series Special Projects. Jacqueline is the director of U of T's Small Vocal Jazz Ensemble, the conductor of the St. James Children's Choir, an assistant conductor with the Toronto Children's Chorus Kindernotes, and a faculty member at Ovation! Performing Arts.

Canadian/British bass-baritone **Giles Tomkins** is widely praised for his vocal virtuosity and lyricism in an impressive range of repertoire. His rich, resonant voice brings "authority and power" to the concert and operatic stage. Recent concert engagements include Handel's *Messiah* with Elmer Iseler Singers, Dvorak's *Stabat Mater* with Vancouver Symphony and Bach's *Peasant Cantata* with Toronto Masque Theatre. In 2018–19, Giles returned to Manitoba Opera as Don Basilio (*II Barbiere di Siviglia*), and sang the role of Dr. Grenvil in both Edmonton Opera and Pacific Opera Victoria's production of *La Traviata*. Giles recently portrayed Gandalf in Dean Burry's *The Hobbit* with Canadian Children's Opera Company. Future engagements for Giles include *Messiah* with Regina Symphony and Zuniga (*Carmen*) with Manitoba Opera in 2020.

Charis Wong recently graduated from the University of Toronto's Voice Performance program, and is looking forward to beginning a master's program at U of T, studying with Dr. Darryl Edwards. With COSI Connection, she has performed roles such as Rose Maybud in *Ruddigore*, and recently covered the role of Mrs. Fiorentino in Kurt Weill's *Street Scene* with the U of T Opera Undergrad program. She is currently working on the role of Galatea in Dean Burry's one-act opera *Il Giudizio di Pigmalione*, also with COSI Connection. Besides performing, she also enjoys volunteering at music camps and working with young children. Having received her ARCT in Piano Performance, studying under Dr. Michael Esch, she is a vital assistant to the choir director of her local church, and helps in leading and accompanying the choir. She is very excited to be participating for the first time in one of Confluence's Concerts!

- The launch of a new podcast series, entitled "Confluence: The Podcast" on and about music to be housed on the brand-new Confluence website


In addition, Confluence is a platform for young artists, students and pre-professionals, to interact with seasoned pros.

Artistic Producer Larry Beckwith has been ably assisted in planning this new mandate by a whole host of outstanding and diverse figures from Toronto's amazing music scene, most notably 2018-19 curators and associates Marion Newman, Cole Alvis, Tom Allen, Patricia O'Callaghan and Andrew Downing.

Confluence has grown out of Beckwith's work with Toronto Masque Theatre from 2003-2018. TMT was an interdisciplinary performing arts company that presented over 65 critically-acclaimed programs of music theatre, commissioned nine premieres from leading Canadian creative artists and was known far and wide for its innovative programming.

Tonight's concert is taking place on the traditional Indigenous territory of the Huron-Wendat, Haudenosaunee, and most recently, the territory of the Mississaugas of the New Credit. This territory is part of the Dish with One Spoon Treaty, an agreement between the Anishinaabe, Haudenosaunee and allied nations to peaceably share and care for the resources around the Great Lakes. This territory is also covered by the Upper Canada Treaties. We are grateful to have the opportunity to meet and work on this territory.
